It's no secret that I'm a "city girl." I haven't always lived in the city, though.

My first full-time call to ministry was to Boone Grove Christian Church in Boone Grove, Indiana. Set in the middle of corn and soybean fields, Boone Grove consisted of a church, a school, a post office, a general store and a cluster of houses.

We had barely arrived when a huge snowstorm dumped well over a foot of snow. It pretty much shut us in. The next morning, we were surprised to hear a knock on the door. The store had loaded a snowmobile with gallons of milk – one for each family in the village with a child. We didn't even know they knew we lived there – much less that we had a one year old. (We didn't know small town life very well, yet!) I've never forgotten that simple act of

kindness, that expression of community. That would not have happened in the city where I grew up.

All these many years later (I just celebrated 36 years of ordained ministry last month) it's wonderful to be back in congregational ministry in a village with a church, a school (college!), a post office, a general store and cluster of houses. A place where you don't go unnoticed, and small acts of kindness happen frequently, where people know each other and each other's business usually in a helpful way. It's good to be in a place where the history runs deep, but where the creative energy of students gives constant hope for a vibrant future.

We had been planning, later this month, to celebrate the formal covenant of our relationship as congregation and pastor. Unfortunately, the occasion of my installation must now be postponed as part of the effort to reduce the spread of COVID-19.

Nevertheless, I am grateful to be here. It feels like coming full circle in my ministry. At the same time, I'm also excited to see what new things will unfold as we move forward together. We are certainly in a time when the challenges before us will require all our gifts of wisdom, courage, creativity and spiritual insight.

Thanks be to God for calling us to this shared journey now.

Shimenawa

An object bound by "shimenawa" (rope) and festooned with "shide" (the zig-zagged white paper) often indicates a sacred or pure place that wards off evil spirits. To the left, the tree in front of the church, destined to be cut down, is adorned with shimenawa and shide.

Ash Wednesday

The season of Lent is the period prior to Easter. The period, which lasts from Ash Wednesday to Easter, extends for 40 days (excluding Sundays). The observance of Lent varies greatly among Christians, both in denominational participation, and according to personal practice. It is most prominent in the life of the Catholic Church, but it is valued by members of most denominations as well as nondenominational churches. Lent is regarded as an opportunity for reflection, as the time approaches to commemorate the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The contrast of experience and emotion, in recalling these two events is to be expected. It would not be exaggeration to think of Good Friday and Easter as the best and worst events in history. This tension affects the nature of the reflection that believers engage in. Many believe that the compelling theme of Lent should be remorse. We should, according to this school of thought, be considering our collective guilt, which required Christ to lose his life. Others celebrate the coming of Christ as a divine gift, for which they are grateful. Additionally, the theology of redemption and the new covenant between God and humanity occupy much of the consideration of this season. Ultimately, persons will determine for themselves how involved they will be in Lenten observation and how to conduct their observance. Congregations, regions, and special shared gatherings will offer opportunities to choose from.



Accordingly, being more positive leads to greater productivity at work, a more satisfying relationship with friends and family, and for sure... a greater sense of peace within oneself.

Sometimes we tend to absorb negativity from others and cannot "let go" of it. It's not that we can't forgive, but rather that we can't forget. It was a newly purchased ball that I had somehow talked my mom into buying. Life was good, the sun was shining, and the air was warm. I remember thinking that my mom would be so impressed if I hung up the shirt and also didn't lose the safety pin. I decided to pin the shirt to the ball. Although I was feeling quite accomplished with my critical thinking skills at this early age, of course I missed a significant point,....yes, point! As the ball slowly expired, I too was emotionally deflated. especially after being chastised by my mom. In that traumatic instance, it felt like I lost the respect of my mom AND the ball!

I can assure you that my mom has since offered up some "positivity" along the way but what astounds me is my inability to forget that incident. What it teaches me is to just "play it safe" and try to find the good in every situation because ultimately you don't want to be responsible for another's everlasting, deflatable moment.
